What does SATs stand for?

Statutory Assessment Tasks and Tests (also includes Teacher Assessment)


Taken at the end of Key Stage 1 (at age 7) and at the end of Key Stage 2 (at age 11)

When do these tests take place?



- Week beginning 13th May 2019
- Tests take place during that week
- Children can not generally take them earlier or later
- There is at least one test per day

What are children assessed in?



Reading

Grammar Punctuation Spelling

Reasoning in Maths

Arithmetic

Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling – Monday 13th May am

Two papers:

- Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar which is marked out of 50
- Separate spelling test of 20 words

Marks from both tests will be combined to give children an overall score out of 70

- This test will have roughly 45 questions
- Questions will test children's knowledge on a range of areas:
- Word class
- Punctuation
- Function of sentences
- Sentence structure
- Tense
- Vocabulary
- Standard English

- There will be different types of questions:
- Multiple choice

- Inserting punctuation



- Reading Test will be marked out of 50
- Reading Test could focus on several genres such as:

Narrative, Information, Opinion, Letters, Poetry, Interview and Instructions



 The test will contain three texts that become progressively harder

They are usually2-3 pages each

- Each text roughly has about 11 questions of different types
- Tick boxes, order
 events, match answers
- One word answers
- Answer that require 1
 or 2 sentences
- Longer more detailed answers

These questions will tests a range of reading skills:

Literal retrieval

Children will be required to scan and skim read to retrieve particular information from the text e.g. How long did the fastest swim across the channel take?

Inference

Children will be required to use clues to infer information on character's feelings/actions and make predictions

e.g. How is the whale made to seem mysterious? Give two ways.

Word meaning

Children will be required to show their understanding of vocabulary and explain author's word choice

e.g. What word is closest in meaning to crouched?

Structure

Explain how texts are structured and how this contributes to meaning as a whole

e.g. Draw lines to match each section to its content

Compare

Make comparisons across the text

Mathematics


- There will be three maths papers:
 - Paper 1: Arithmetic
 - Paper 2: Reasoning 1
 - Paper 3: Reasoning 2
- Scores from all three papers will be combined and children will receive a total raw score out of 110


Arithmetic Wednesday 15th May am


Children have 30 minutes to answer questions which will test their calculation and mental maths. There is usually about 35 questions.

It will be scored out of 40


- Most questions are worth 1 mark:
- mental arithmetic
- written methods for addition/subtraction
- addition and subtraction of fractions
- multiplication and division of fractions
- order of operations
- fractions/percentages of amounts








Long division/long multiplication are worth two marks






Reasoning 1 Wednesday 15th May am


- Children have 40 minutes to answer questions which will test their reasoning and problem solving
- It will be scored out of 35


Reasoning 2 Thursday 16th May am


- Children have 40 minutes to answer questions which will test their reasoning and problem solving
- It will be scored out of 35

- Reasoning papers will test their problem solving skills on a range of areas:
 - Number
 - Shape
 - Measures
 - Statistics
 - Fractions, Decimals and Percentages
 - Algebra
 - Ration and Proportion









How is SATs week organised?



- A timetable is issued to school, telling us what day each tests take place
- All children must sit the tests at the same time, under test conditions
- Test papers are opened with the children
- Tests are completed in classrooms, with any displays that may help covered over



What revision support will be provided?

- After Easter, lessons will take on a revision style format: all areas will be revisited from the curriculum and children will be encouraged to make revision cards to aid them
- Revision material will be sent home as homework beginning this week. We have bought CGP SAT Buster books and created a homework timetable for the children to complete these.
- If children need support with these, we will be having a homework club on Thursday lunch times.



How could you support your child at home?

- Encourage use of revision materials
- Provide a working space which is away from distractions such as the television and computers
- Sit with them and work through a few sample questions
- Encourage them to ask at school for help if there is anything they don't understand
- Help them to make a revision timetable
- Practise little and often small areas of work
- Ensure that your child has regular breaks and is rewarded for hard work and effort
- Revision Guides

What information do parents get and when?




- Maths, grammar and reading test papers are sent to external markers after the tests and arrive back to school normally in the first week of July.
- Schools then check the results and papers to ensure there are no errors- sometimes papers may be sent back for re-marking.
- Schools must inform parents of SATs results (this is likely to be in the last week of term).

How will SATs result be reported?



- Due to the changing of the curriculum, levels no longer exist
- The government will convert raw scores achieved on each paper to a standardised score of 100.


A standardised score of 100 will represent the new national average (i.e. children who are meeting Year 6 expecta



How will SATs result be reported?




A score of 99 or below will indicate that the children have not met national expectations.



How will SATs result be reported?



 Last year a scaled score of between 110 and 120 (maximum scaled score) suggested children were working at a greater depth within the expected standard.



What information do secondary schools receive?



- Information is transferred to the high schools.
- This includes SATs results, Year 6 teacher assessments, plus other relevant information.
- High schools have this information by July, which helps them to group children and provide necessary support.
- However, they will also likely carry out their own assessments when the children start the high school.

How can you help your child in the week of the tests?

- Make sure they get enough sleep.
- Make sure they eat breakfast. We will be providing a small breakfast everyday at 8:45am before the tests begin.
- Arrive at school on time.
- Don't try and frighten them into revising.
- Encourage them to ask a teacher if they are unsure about anything.
- Explain that the SATs are a way of showing what they know!!

And finally ...


- The tests are only a snapshot




